Never Leave Children Alone in a Car



Boosting Car Passenger Safety in Florida


Florida's child passenger safety law is the weakest in the country. On Monday, April 28, Florida lawmakers passed a bill sponsored by Rep. Keith Perry (R-FL) and Sen. Anitere Flores (R-FL) that will require children to ride in a booster or car seat through age 5. A similar bill was vetoed and, as we go to press, Safe Kids is urging Governor Rick Scott to sign the bill. Read all about it.
