

- The death rate from unintentional injuries declined by 55.4% from 1987 to 2010.
 - In 1987, 16,501 children ages 19 and under died from unintentional injuries, and the death rate was 23.39 per 100,000 children.¹
 - In 2010, 8,684 children ages 19 and under died from unintentional injuries, and the death rate was 10.43 per 100,000 children.¹
 - The number of unintentional injury deaths fell by 47.4% during this time period.¹

Unintentional injury fatalities and death rate among children ages 19 and under, 1987-2010¹






Injuries

- The number and rate of non-fatal injuries has stayed relatively constant from 2001 to 2012. In 2012, an estimated 9,038,763 children ages 19 and under were seen in emergency departments for nonfatal unintentional injuries, with an injury rate of 11.0 per 100 children.¹
- Said another way, 1 in 9 children ages 19 and under will be seen in an emergency department for a non-fatal unintentional injury.

Racial and ethnic disparities

 American Indian/Alaska Native and African American children are at increased risk of injuryrelated death, compared to white children.

Unintentional injury death rate for children ages 19 and under, by race, 2010¹




 African-American and American Indian/Alaska Native children are at increased risk of injuryrelated death, as compared to white children, in several risk areas.
